100 rock hewn hermitages discovered in the area.

more than one thousand manuscripts, some on parchment. Written in Greek, Coptic and Arabic, they attest to the great vitality of the monastery at least up until the 13th century

11th century paintings portraying the Archangel Gabriel, Saint Mercurius and Saint George - Other recently revealed paintings include the Holy Virgin, Christ, Saint Bisada and Saint Simeon the Stylite. In addition, the central apse was adorned with a painting of the Holy Virgin and the Apostles, and some of this artwork could be assigned to an even earlier period than the 11th century.
